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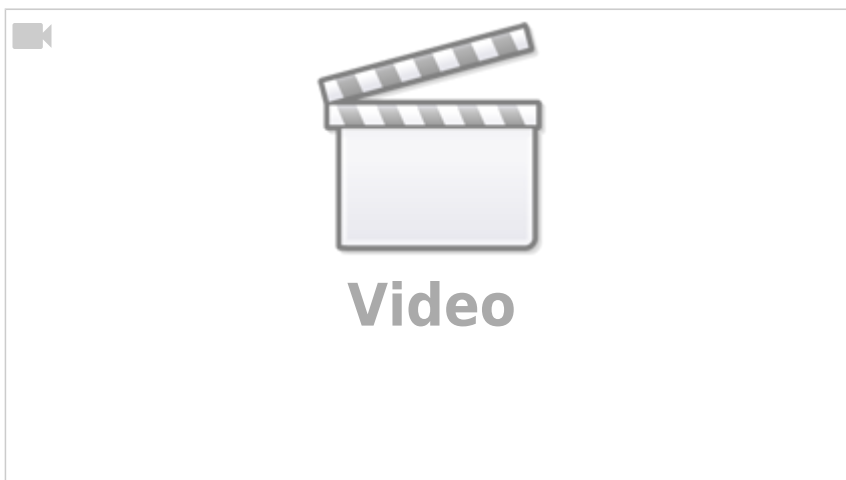
# What I would like to do with a partner

## Find a **ACTIVE** hobby that we share

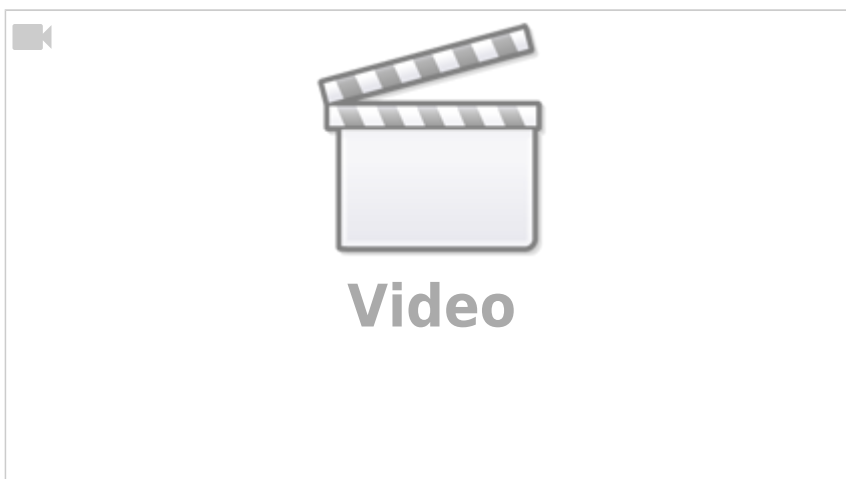
### Some ideas of things that we could do together:

  - E.g. Making plushies



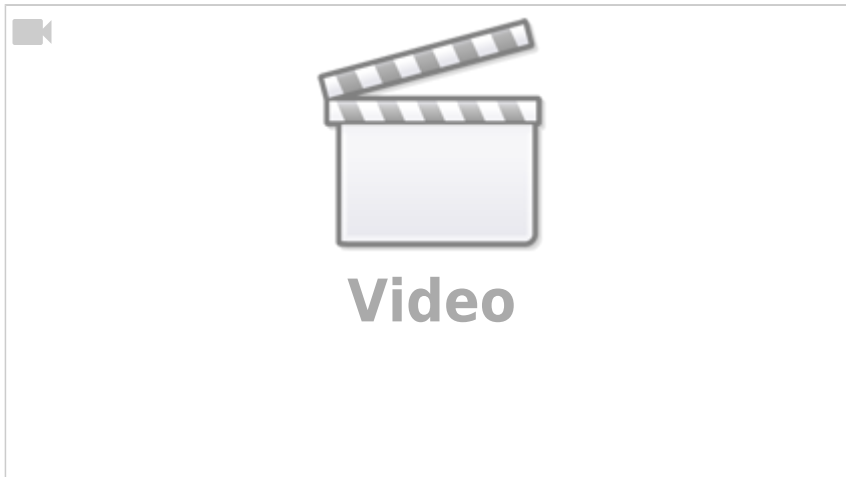
- Doing recreational activities together

- Playing co-op video games together that emphasize teamwork, where we're working together. Cuphead as an example.



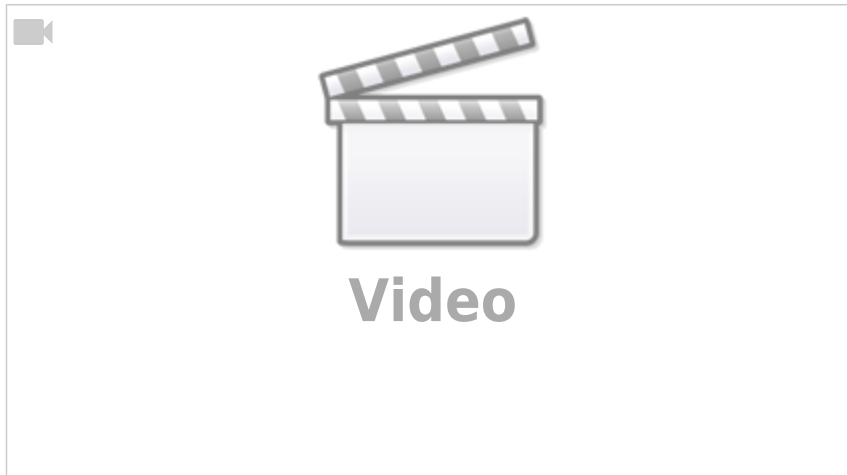
- Trying to make a LEGO MOC and seeing if LEGO would approve it for their LEGO ideas line <sup>1)</sup>

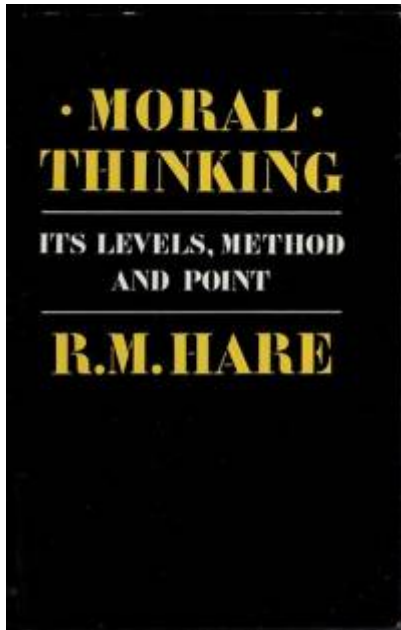

  - E.g. Swimming



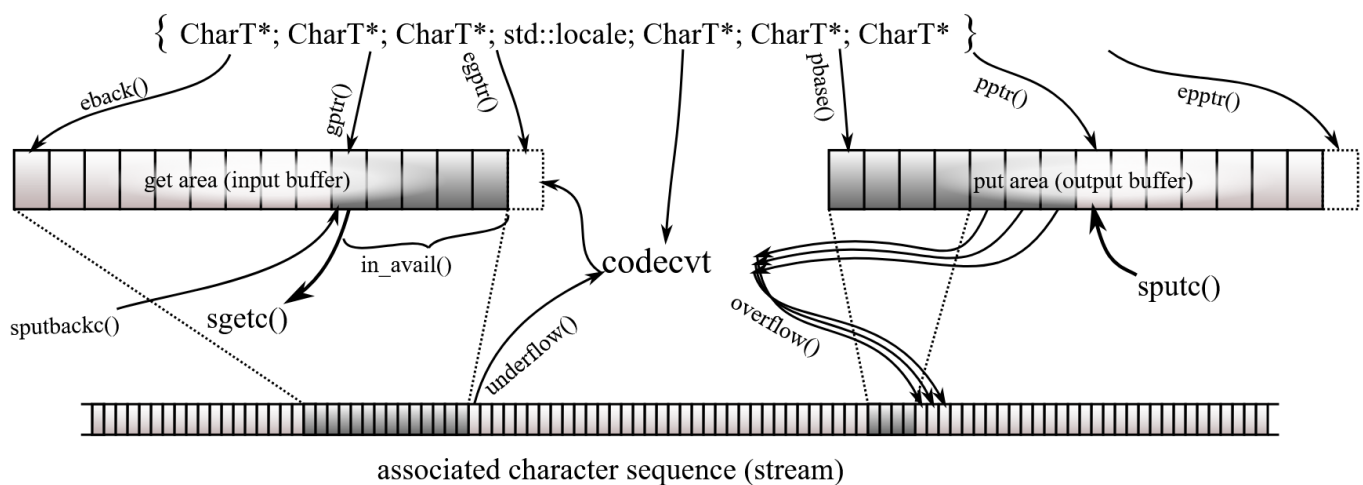
- Discussing books together. I read all kinds of books on all sorts of subjects.
